

Parking and Public Transit:

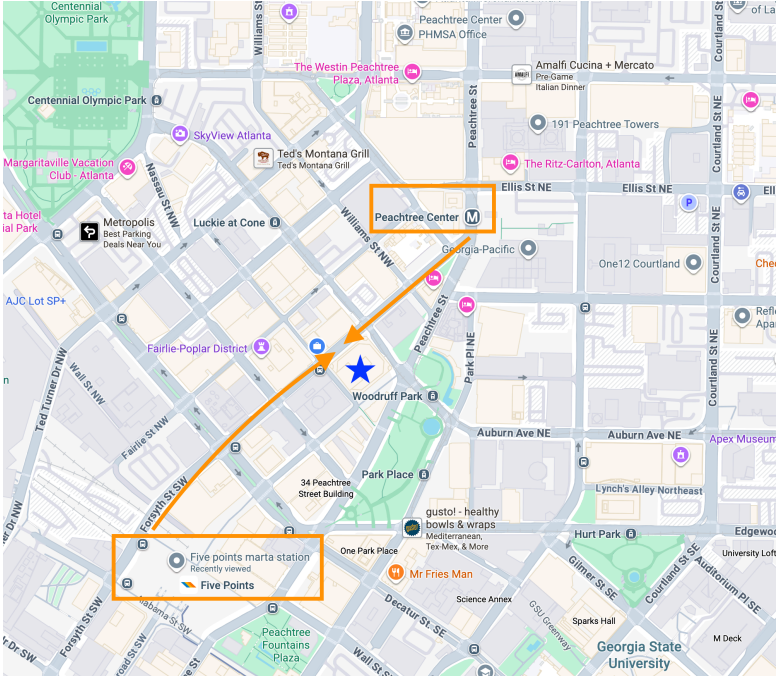
Several parking structures are available on or near campus; parking in any of these facilities usually runs \$10-\$20 per day. The closest on-campus parking deck is the T deck on the corner of John Wesley Dobbs Ave. and Peachtree Center Ave NE, circled in ORANGE in the map below.

This map shows the location of Aderhold Learning Center and the T deck as well as some nearby public parking structures (orange circles) that charge by the hour or day:



If you are not staying in a downtown hotel within walking distance of the venue, you might be better served by using the MARTA train to travel from your lodging to campus; a round-trip fare is \$5. The closest train station on the North-South line is Peachtree Center Station or on the East-West line, Five Points (Five Points is the main transit hub). Many of the train stations outside of the downtown area offer free all-day parking for commuters. (I don't recommend Atlanta's bus system in general because we have no dedicated bus lanes, meaning that you end up having to deal with the terrible traffic and construction delays.)

Lunch and Coffee Restaurants in Walking Distance:

On Friday, you'll find a wide range of quick casual restaurants on Broad St. NW and Peachtree St. adjacent (south and east) of our conference venue. Many of these spots may not be open on Saturday, as most downtown restaurants cater to the M-F business and university crowd.

Marie recommends these options on Broad street:

Rosa's Pizza (grab-and-go slices)

NaanStop (casual Indian, streetfood-inspired)

Ali Baba Mediterranean (Turkish falafel, schwarma , and salads)

Reuben's Deli

Café Lucia, around the corner on Walton St. (sandwiches, coffee and teas, pastries)

... or these on Peachtree street, one block closer to the park:

Blossom Tree (Korean fusion)

BT burger (burgers and fries)

Anatolia Cafe & Hookah Lounge (Mediterranean food)

Across Woodruff Park, on Park Place SE, you'll find additional options:

Gusto! (Wraps and bowls)

India Eats Restaurant

Pho King Express (Vietnamese)

Highland Bakery (sandwiches, breakfast plates, pastries, coffee)

I can also recommend the food hall in Peachtree Center (225 Peachtree St.), a large underground shopping and business center with different fast-casual food options.
